Environmental Justice communities include low-income populations and minority populations."  • A low-income population is any readily identifiable group of low-income persons who live in geographic proximity, and, if circumstances warrant, geographically dispersed/transient persons. A low-income person has a median household income at or below the Department of Health and Human Services' poverty guidelines.  • A minority population is composed of Black, Hispanic, Asian-American, or American Indian and Alaskan Native individuals. Each, several, or all of these ethnic groups may live in geographic proximity to one another or may be geographically scattered or transient (e.g., migrant workers) who will be similarly affected by a proposed program, policy, or activity.
